

Martin Luther King Jr.

Dr. King was born in January 15,
1929. He grew up in Atlanta,
Georgia, his birthplace, he was
educated to fight racial
prejudice like his father, Dr. King
Sr. With his siblings, he went to
a public primary school. At the
age of 15, he entered

Morehouse College in Atlanta, where he was a popular student. Dr. King studied several bible classes as a way to put Christianity as a potential force for Social change. He moved to Boston, where he enrolled in the Boston University and married singer Coretta Scott in 1953. When he was 25 years old, King graduated from Boston University as a Theologist and became a Pastor in Alabama's Baptist Church. King participated in numerous boycotts and non-violent protests, and in 1955, he was elected president of the Nonviolent Negro Organization for civil rights. As a leader, he gave more than 250 speeches across the US, where he called for social conscience and acceptance for all races, not only Blacks. His more memorable speech was the "I have a dream" speech in Washington DC for more than 250,000 people. Dr. King was assassinated in a motel in Memphis, Tennessee, in 1968.
